





#### Zach's Snacks

Easter Sunday, the day on which Jesus rose from the dead, is a day of special rejoicing for Christians. Easter Sunday also marks the end of the Lenten fast. The concepts of renewal and rebirth play an important role in what we eat at during Easter celebrations.

Eggs are traditionally connected with rebirth, rejuvenation and immortality. Easter eggs are sometimes decorated with bright colors to honor this celebration. Conversely, the abstinence of eggs is associated with Lent.

Even the earliest civilizations held springtime festivals to welcome the sun's rising from its long winter sleep. They thought of the sun's return from darkness as an annual miracle and regarded the egg as a natural wonder and a proof of the renewal of life. As Christianity spread, the egg was adopted as a symbol of Christ's Resurrection from the tomb.

No one knows how long ago the custom began in China of giving red eggs to children on their birthdays; red for the Chinese symbolizes long life and happiness. The Persians have also exchanged elaborately gilded and painted eggs for thousands of years. Christianity readily adopted eggs...to its own symbolic uses. The shell became the symbol of the tomb from which Christ had risen and the meat of the egg the representation of resurrection, of the new life of the new Christian, and of the hope of eternal life

Among Easter foods the most significant is the Easter lamb, which is in many places the main dish of the Easter Sunday meal. Corresponding to the Passover lamb and to Christ, the Lamb of God, this dish has become a central symbol of Easter. Also popular among European and Americans on Easter is ham, because the pig was considered a symbol of luck in pre-Christian Europe. Religions use food to forge identity and create community. Early Christians embraced ham, in part, to proclaim their religious beliefs.

Easter celebrates the resurrection of Christ but it also celebrates fertility, and the season of renewal. On Holy Thursday to commemorate the Last Supper, when Christ shared bread with his disciples, brioche or egg bread is prepared in absolute silence. Easter has always had a close association with food. The word comes from the name for the Anglo-Saxon goddess of light and spring, Easter, and special dishes were cooked in her honor so that the year would be endowed with fertility.

Most important of these dishes was a small spiced bun, from which our hot cross bun derives. The practice of eating special small cakes at the time of the Spring festival seems to date back at least to the ancient Greeks, but the English custom of eating spiced buns on Good Friday was perhaps institutionalized in Tudor times, when a London bylaw was introduced forbidding the sale of such buns except on Good Friday, at Christmas, and at burials.



### Rev. Ing's Things

Dear Ones,

If you are reading this, it is April! Sweet Miss Liz has put together another attractive and informative Oak Leaf, and it is filled with spring events and news about Easter celebrations. As I write this, however, it is mid-March. It is still winter, and today feels like it, for sure. Yes, yes, Easter is coming. But right now...well, it is still Lent. The days ARE getting longer...but we know there is still quite a lot of darkness to experience before we gather and sing "Alleluia! The strife is o'er, the battle

We have a long walk to the cross with Jesus before we get to the empty tomb. Some of us are traveling with Jesus on that road carrying our own crosses: grief, confusion, worry, pain. When I read about the ongoing suffering of the Ukrainian people, learn about another hate crime, or become aware of more devastating news about the health of our planet, I cry out, "How long, O God, when will Easter come?"

When I feel like all is lost in this life, and the only hope will come with the resurrected one, God reminds me that one of the core truths of the Christian faith is the promise that we have the gift of ABUNDANT life. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection AND the life." Theologian Karoline Lewis explains this way: "We tend to focus on the resurrection that we situate for ourselves as a distant promise, our guarantee of salvation, our eternal life with God and Jesus in heaven. But what might it mean that Jesus is the resurrection AND the life? That we are raised to life, not [just] as future salvific existence, but to life right now, right here, with Jesus?"

In the midst of suffering and confusion, we have LIFE; our God is present with us, our God is crying with and for us as we cry, and our God is wrapping us in sustaining, empowering love and care. God equips and calls us to be bearers of light to one another, especially in the darkest of times. God's love provides LIFE, not just in the future but now. And we can encourage one another to partake of this beautiful gift, not just at Easter, but every day.

Everyone is welcome to the chapel on Sundays at 1:30 pm. Sunday, April 2, is Palm Sunday. During Holy Week, all are invited to a Stations of the Cross service at 3:00 pm. Easter Sunday, April 9, we will celebrate Love's defeat of hate once and for all!

Thank you for being brilliant lights in this Christ-soaked world.
